On June 22, thousands of people from all over the Springfield area volunteered for a day of service to local non-profits. Catholic Charities of Southern Missouri was blessed to host 43 volunteers from three organizations and our faithful Garden Friends for the 2023 United Way Day of Caring to work alongside many CCSOMO staff.

Our friends from the City of Springfield Environmental Services Department returned for the third year with a team of thirteen to tackle our most heavy-duty needs. From clearing off the roof and digging up stumps and rockpiles to hauling off our colossal brush pile, they always work until the job is done.

Eleven staff members from TelComm Credit Union painted inside LifeHouse in Springfield. They transformed our dining room and three offices with bright new paint! MSU's Office of Dual Credit sent five staffers who worked in the gardens, along with our Garden Friends. This group labored in the hot sun, pulling weeds, tidying the flower beds, and harvesting vegetables.

The capital campaign is complete with donations, pledges, and grants to make this incredible dream a reality! This year marks the tenth anniversary of LifeHouse Crisis Maternity Home in Springfield and the year of construction in Cape Girardeau. A huge thank you goes to all the donors who helped raise the necessary funds to bring LifeHouse in Cape Girardeau to southeast Missouri!

The construction of our newest LifeHouse is no longer in its infancy. The underground plumbing and utilities are complete, the foundation and floors are poured, and the framing has begun. The administration offices, community room and classroom for LifeHouse are taking shape. It's exciting to watch LifeHouse going vertical! The construction team is making significant progress daily and is on track to finish by the end of February.

LifeHouse will be a safe place for homeless pregnant women with no place to call home and little hope for their babies' futures. They will come to LifeHouse with backgrounds of abuse and neglect, addiction, trafficking, and poverty. They will be cared for and loved, connected to healthcare and mental health counseling. Infant care, parenting, and other life skills are all a part of the program. A woman who comes to LifeHouse will have access to the education she needs to bring a healthy baby into the world whom she can love and care for and raise in a safe and loving home.

Just like LifeHouse in Springfield, every aspect of LifeHouse in Cape Girardeau is carefully designed to give women the best chance to be self-sufficient and successful. The LifeHouse program has had ten years to grow into a proven model with 126 healthy babies born and saving the Springfield community an estimated \$1,000,000+ in healthcare costs alone. The same thing will happen in southeast Missouri when LifeHouse in Cape Girardeau opens in early 2024. None of this would have been possible without your help. 






PICTURE OF SUCCESS

The picture of success looks different to everyone. Success for the Housing Team at CCSOMO is a client settled safely into their home. Recently, Case Manager, Gabby Rolon, received a referral for Sarah, a woman in Taney County fleeing a domestic violence situation with her young son. This mother and child were staying in a shelter but only had a few weeks left before their time was up, and they would either be homeless or return to their abusive situation. At first, Sarah was scared to even be enrolled in our program for fear of not being able to succeed on her own, but after lots of talking and encouragement, she took the necessary step, and Gabby quickly enrolled her in our Rapid Re-Housing program. Within two weeks, Gabby found housing with a new property manager in Branson, which is extremely difficult in the current rental market. Their move-in day was scheduled but fell after the family's original exit date from the shelter, but thanks to Gabby's advocacy for her client, they received an extension to allow them to remain sheltered until they could have a smooth transition to their new home. On movein day, Gabby said, "Sarah cried during the process and thanked me repeatedly for helping her find housing and even gave me a big hug." While her apartment is only a studio, Sarah said, "Living in a small studio is better than being hurt every day." She is grateful and relieved to be safely away from her abuser. Gabby will continue to work with this family to provide case management and rental assistance to achieve self-sufficiency. For this sweet family, success is looking better all the

PURPOSE HOME REPAIR: A GODSEND TO A VETERAN

Ralph Beaver joined the Navy in 1957 and served as a Signalman on a Minesweeper in Korea, China, the Philippines, Alaska, Japan, and Thailand. He said of his stint in the military, "It is an experience you will remember for the rest of your life." After the military, Ralph spent 30 years as an over-the-road truck driver. It was the dream of Ralph and his wife, Anne, to have a house on a small acreage, and 25 years ago, their dreams came true. Ralph and Anne enjoyed their home on 10 acres near Diamond, MO, until Anne passed away three years ago after a year-long battle with brain cancer.

It was then that Ralph's daughter, Shyra, began noticing problems in the house. The bathroom floor was weak, and there was an apparent leak. Social Security was his only income, so Ralph didn't have extra money for repairs and was afraid he would have to sell the property where he and his wife had spent so many happy years together. Fortunately, he learned of the Critical Home Repair Program through the Joplin Area Habitat for Humanity. Ralph fits the criteria for the program, which targets older, physically disabled veteran households. That's where Catholic Charities' Purpose Home Repair Program stepped in to help. Joplin Habitat for Humanity contracted Purpose to complete significant repairs for qualified homeowners in need. When the project inspectors came, they found more critical repair issues than just his bathroom. Purpose put on a new roof and gutters, installed new windows and a new kitchen stove, completely rehabbed the bathroom, relocated the hot water heater to the garage, replaced the old plumbing with upgraded lines, and painted the house's exterior. All of this is "a Godsend to me," said Ralph. Kirk Brewer, Director of Construction for CCSOMO, called Ralph Beaver "an amazing client to work with."

Ralph knew he could never afford all the work himself; he summed up his feelings, saying, "I keep thinking that I'll wake up one day, and this is a dream, that I'm so thankful for all the blessings I received from this."

VOLUNTEER HIGHLIGHTS

The Garden Friends started working on the grounds before CCSOMO moved into St Anne's Monastery in 2013. A few Holy Trinity garden ministry members ensured the flower beds, shrubs, and trees looked nice. Year after year, the garden and the Garden Friends grew, and today we have 21 raised beds for vegetables, fruits, and herbs, fruit trees, and a greenhouse; the team has grown to 50! The garden provides fresh organic food to the women and children of LifeHouse Crisis Maternity Home.

The Garden Friends hold monthly workdays from March through October, but several volunteers can be found a few days every week planting, harvesting, watering, and finding inventive ways to succeed. They crafted an irrigation system, built squirrel and rabbit-proof enclosures for the tomatoes and strawberries, and bird-proofed the berries.

In 2022, the gardeners worked over 900 hours caring for the garden and beautiful flowers, most of which were planted and tended by the Carmelite Nuns, for whom the Monastery was built in the early 1960s. The grounds cover more than 11 acres, and with dozens of big trees, there is a volunteer job for everyone. They say that if one needs something cut down, they only need to lean out their door and yell, and eager chainsaw wielders will come running. True or not, several men are eager for chainsaw duty every time! These wonderful volunteers find what they like to do, and they excel. Whether it's flowers, vegetables, shrubs, or engineering, they put their heart and soul into the job. Often the most unlikely person takes on a task. Some might call her a little old lady, but the Garden Friend who weeds and mulches the berm is a mighty warrior!

The volunteers are the only reason our garden exists, our LifeHouse residents have access to fresh organic food, and this nearly 60-year-old Monastery looks so good. One would think we have gardeners. They would be right.
